Dear Chairman Obey and Ranking Member Walsh:

We are writing to respectfully request that you support full funding for the underage drinking prevention activities authorized by the Sober Truth on Preventing (STOP) Underage Drinking Act, Public Law 109-422, in the FY 2009 appropriations process.

Underage drinking is a critical public health and safety issue, particularly for children and adolescents. Each year about 5,000 people under age 21 die from injuries involving underage drinking. Approximately 1,900 (38%) of those deaths involve motor vehicle crashes, about 1,600 (32%) result from homicides, and about 300 (6%) result from suicides. Every day, 7,000 children under the age of 16 take their first alcoholic drink. Adolescents who begin drinking before the age of 15 are four times more likely to develop alcohol dependence as an adult than those who wait until age 21. Each additional year of delayed drinking onset reduces the probability of alcohol dependence by 14%.

Passage of the STOP Act in December, 2006 represented a bi-cameral, bi-partisan effort to combat underage alcohol use and abuse. Thanks to the Subcommittee's support, these programs were partially funded in the FY 2008 appropriations cycle at the level of \$5.4 million* out of the total \$18 million authorized. It is essential that STOP Act programs be continued and fully funded in FY 2009 to make a significant national commitment to reducing and preventing underage drinking.

Unfortunately, the President's budget for FY 2009 would zero-out funding for those critical prevention programs, just as they are getting started. Please reject these proposed cuts and ensure that the provisions of the STOP Act are fully funded in FY 2009 at the following levels and to the following agencies authorized in the STOP Act:

* Including the 1.75% across-the-board cut that applied to all FY 2008 funding. FY 2008 funding for STOP Act programs included \$4 million for community enhancement grants to local Drug Free Communities coalitions; \$1 million for the national adult oriented media campaign and \$500,000 for the Interagency Coordinating Committee.

Department of Health and Human Services:

- Interagency Coordinating Committee on the Prevention of Underage Drinking; Annual Report on State Underage Drinking and Prevention and Enforcement Activities: **\$1 million**

Department of Health and Human Services, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA):

- National adult-oriented media campaign to prevent underage drinking: **\$1 million**
- Community-based Coalition Enhancement Grants to Prevent Underage Drinking for Current or Past Drug Free Communities Grantees: **\$5 million**

Department of Education:

- Grants Directed at Preventing and Reducing Alcohol Abuse at Institutions of Higher Education: **\$5 million**

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the National Institute on Alcoholism and Alcohol Abuse (NIAAA):

- Expansion of research capabilities to capture new surveillance data on underage drinking: **\$6 million**. Within these amounts, not less than one-third should be provided to the Centers for Disease Control to develop and continue its work to monitor and report on youth exposure to alcohol advertising.

The STOP Act is a critical component of our nation's strategy to keep our children and adolescents alcohol and drug-free. Please ensure that underage drinking prevention activities authorized by the STOP Act are fully funded at a level of \$18 million in the FY 2009 Labor, Health and Human Services and Education appropriations bill.
